Bishop's Heart Lent

Lent is an ideal time for us to draw closer to God. When John the Baptist conducted his preaching ministry in the desert he cried out, "repent" (Mt 3:1), and when Jesus began to preach in Galilee he said the same thing, "repent." (Mk 1:15) Jesus' message is also to repent and believe in the salvation that is now here. To repent, from the Greek word metanoia, means to change one's mind and agree that one's sins are abhorrent. It is not only remorse for sin but a turning away from sin and self-centeredness and turning back to God. Repentance is a changed attitude that chooses to live for God. To "believe", from the Greek word pisteuo, means to be fully convinced. To "believe" and to "repent" go hand in hand. It is impossible to fully believe in Jesus' message of salvation and not turn away from our sins. (1 John 3:4-6) We will never be perfect on this earth, but our inclination to live a sinful life should change into a desire to live for God.

When Peter preached his first sermon at Pentecost, the Scripture says his hearers were "cut to the heart" and asked, "what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37) Peter told them they must repent. Repentance and prayer are one of the best ways to turn to God! If you have never prayed very seriously, or if your prayer life has fallen on hard times, Lent is a wonderful occasion to repent and start or restart your communicative relationship with God.

When we come before the Lord, in the light of His holiness it reveals the inadequacy of our lives. When Simon Peter first glimpsed at Jesus during the miraculous catch of fish, the power of the miracle caused Peter to say, "Go away from me, Lord; I am a sinful man!" (Luke 5:8)

If we are in any way choosing to do what we want, rather than what the Lord wants, it's time to examine our consciousness and draw closer to Christ.

Lent is a time of conversion – a time to return to the Lord in whatever ways we have turned against or away from him. We should return to the Lord in our attitudes, our conversations, our plans, and our goals, even in our hopes and our dreams. May repentance, reflection, rededication, and renewal be your portion this Lenten season.



Come Closer

James 4:8 (NASB)

Come close to God and He will come close to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners; and purify your hearts, you double-minded.

The reality of our world is that most of us live according to worldly wisdom, we are driven by envy and we pursue a selfish ambition to get what we want. Yet, there is a call to get back to living according to heaven's wisdom, trusting God to provide all the good we need, and focus selves on serving others How should we respond if we realize we've been living according to worldly wisdom, driven by envy and selfish ambition to get what we want? What should we do if we want to get back to living according to heaven's wisdom, trusting God to provide all the good we need, and focus on serving others? In the previous verse, James describes how we should repent. First, he wrote that we should quit blindly chasing what we want. Instead, we should submit to God. Next, we should resist the devil, instead of continuing to cooperate with him. James promised that when we resist Satan, he will leave. Here in verse 8, James calls us to draw near—to move closer—to God. This comes with an additional promise: God will respond by moving closer to us. That's an incredible act of mercy on God's part. The God of the universe owes us nothing, including His closeness. What grace on His part to come in our direction at all! This is especially gracious as a response to our step in His direction. Next, James calls us sinners to clean our hands. He calls us double-minded people: trying to serve both self and God. James pleads with us to purify our hearts. The idea here is to completely turn from our sin, to resolve that we will serve God, and to begin again. Come closer. In verse 8, James calls us to draw near—to move closer—to God. This comes with an additional promise: God will respond by moving closer to us. That's absolutely incredible! The God of the universe owes us absolutely nothing, including His closeness. What grace on His part to come in our direction at all! This is especially gracious as a

response to our step in His direction. Next, James calls us sinners to clean our hands. He calls us double-minded people, trying to serve both self and God. James pleads with us to purify our hearts. The idea here is to completely turn from our sin, to serve God, and to come closer to His amazing plan for our lives. As we enter this Lenten season of reflection, repentance, and renewal, let's come closer to Jesus, the resurrected one. He lived, died, and rose so we could have access to the Father ...so come closer.
